Nabegh Ghazal Asswad

Dr. Asswad is the Conservation officer at BirdLife Middle East. He has been a Vice President of OSME since 2013, member of the Conservation Research Fund and assisted in editing and revising the Arabic version of the field Guide for Birds of the Middle East. He chaired the Syrian Society for the Conservation of Wildlife (2012-2017) and was involved in various activities for the conservation of birds and for field surveys with SSCW team.

John Burnside



John Burnside has worked on the ecology and conservation of the Asian Houbara in Uzbekistan. While studying the houbara, he often observed endemic Turkestan Ground Jay. The species had not been studied in the wild since soviet times. In 2019, in collaboration with Anna Ten (Uzbekistan Institute of Zoology), and the support of the OSME Conservation Research Fund, John and his team undertook fieldwork to study and estimate the breeding productivity of the Ground Jay in Uzbekistan.

Kaan's studies focus on avian community ecology and conservation. The talk will be about a biodiversity conservation and youth development project, funded by OSME's Youth Development Fund and the French Embassy in Turkey's Biodiversity Conservation Fund. The project aims to understand the factors shaping the breeding microhabitat preferences of the White-headed Duck and helping raise the next generation of female ecologists and conservationists in Turkey.
